

Rural VIP No. 11: Your Connections with RhPAP Programs & Learners

The eleventh survey for the Rural Voice Information Panel (Rural VIP) was sent on August 6, 2020 to 184 members. This document provides a summary of the themes provided by respondents.

Key Learnings



- Q1: Not all respondents had experienced RhPAP initiatives.

 Of those that have, 92 per cent of respondents rate the initiatives as extremely valuable or very valuable.
- Q2: The majority of respondents are **extremely interested** (56 per cent) or very interested (32 per cent) in knowing when health-care learners are in their communities.
- Q3: Over 60 per cent of respondents or members of their A&R committee have connected with health-care learners visiting their community for rural education experiences or placements; 12 per cent of respondents have not connected with visiting learners, while 24 per cent of respondents reported that they were unsure or not aware of learners in the community.
- Q4: When asked about how respondents or their A&R committees have connected with health-care learners, activities included welcoming or following up with learners (92 per cent); providing information packages about the community (85 per cent); inviting learners to local events (46 per cent); and helping with accommodations (46 per cent).
- **Q5:** Respondents shared how their committee finds out about learners coming to the community. Results include hearing from **contacts at the local hospital/clinic**, being informed by an **RhPAP Rural Community Consultant**, or through **Alberta Health Services**.

Good to know

Not all respondents had experienced RhPAP initiatives. Of those that have,
 92 per cent rate the initiatives as extremely valuable or very valuable.



- All respondents who volunteered, supported, or participated in high school skills days and the physician mentorship program found the initiatives to be extremely valuable or very valuable.
- Overall, 95 per cent of respondents who supported accommodations for health-care learners in their communities found the activity to be extremely valuable or very valuable, and 93 per cent of respondents who volunteered, supported, or participated in continuing education training and events for health-care providers reported the initiative to be extremely valuable or very valuable.

"Medical Student Tour of our Attraction and Retention Committee Area."

"Staff who support communities."

"Having an **RhPAP Rep** present during [attraction] and retention committee meetings."

"While we have not hosted a high school skills day, the physicians, nurses (at hospital) and pharmacists have had interested students, from our town and surrounding areas, **job shadow for a day.** The feedback that we have received from those students **has been very positive.**


It gives high school students an opportunity to base their secondary school choice on an actual experience, and hopefully increase their interest in rural medicine/nursing/pharmacy. Rural experiences do offer quite a different experience than in urban centres; something we hear frequently from the learners that we have at the clinic as well."

"Years ago, our community participated in the **medical students** visiting for 48 hrs and connecting to rural medicine options (**UofA & NADC pilot project**)."






2. How interested are you in knowing when health-care learners are in your community?




3. Have you or any members of your attraction and retention committee connected with health-care learners that may be visiting your community for rural education experiences or placements?









4. If you answered 'yes' to Question 3, how have you or your attraction and retention committee connected with learners in your community? Choose all that apply.

"From physicians who head up either the Med students or resident programs. It's a very imperfect process, one that could be improved. We often have little or no advance notice of learners arriving."

"Members of our Attraction and Retention Committee work in the clinic; we receive all notifications of students joining the clinic for their Rural Family Medicine rotation."


"Through our clinic board member or site manager, often miss them though. No consistent connection for the message to flow."
